Trust and Praise God as you Greet the New Year!

Dear Friends,

Last month I mentioned that Advent is the beginning of the new church year. And now, a month later, we begin a new secular year. Both the new church year and the new secular year offer us a fresh start. We don't begin the New Year with a clean slate since we bring with us both the joys and concerns of the previous year. But the New Year brings us hope, new possibilities, a challenge to change to make things better.

As most of you know, at most Sunday worship services, the Scriptures read are based on the Lectionary passage for that Sunday. Lectionary passages are also available for each day of the week. One of the Old Testament, or Hebrew

Bible, texts for Jan. 1 is from Genesis 17: 1-12. This passage has to do with the call of Abraham when God said to him, "I am God almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous ... No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham." Suddenly, Abraham's life was changed. He became a new person, with a new name and a new role in life, all at the age of ninety-nine!

As we ponder the challenge to change that a new year affords us, we hardly expect such a dramatic change as Abraham experienced. But we do know that God acts in unexpected ways, and if we enter the New Year open to new possibilities, who can predict what will happen? 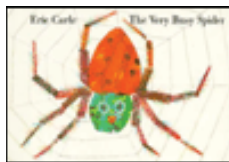
It's Time for Library's Calendar Exchange

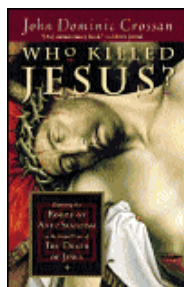

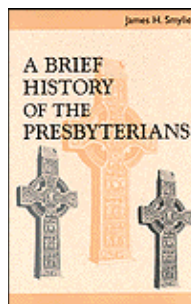

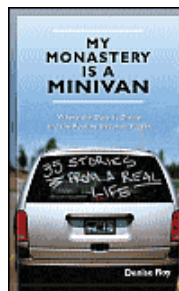

Sunday Adult Study

Jan. 7 & 14: **Humans and the Natural World: A First Look at Environmental Sustainability with Dr. Jonathan Miller, Professor of Geology, San Jose State University**

Greater and greater demands are being made on the Earth for energy, food, water, and land, as more people and nations aspire to Western standards of living and mass consumption. As a result, the climate is warming, soil loss is accelerating, clean water is scarcer, and ongoing armed conflict partly tied to securing energy has become a part of our geopolitical reality. We will look at the changes and modifications occurring on Earth and explore the concept of ecologic and environmental sustainability.

Jan. 28, Feb. 4 – 18: Faith Journeys at Stone Church

Each Sunday, a different member of Stone Church will discuss their personal faith journey, what brought them to Stone; how they have grown at Stone, their hopes, and the spiritual struggles they face today.

Feb. 25: Discussion with Henrietta Perdue Lecturer, Dr. Jack Rogers

Dr. Jack Rogers, author of *Jesus, the Bible, and Homosexuality* (see article at right), will preach this morning and be available at the 11 am hour for an open, free-wheeling discussion.



Dr. Jack Rogers to speak on Homosexuality at next Henrietta Perdue Lecture

The next Henrietta Perdue Memorial Lecture Series will be Fri., Feb. 25, and Sat., Feb. 26. Dr. Jack Rogers will speak on *Jesus, the Bible, and Homosexuality: Explore the Myths, Heal the Church*, based on his recent book.

“In a powerful new book, evangelical theologian and former Moderator of the Presbyterian Church (USA) Jack Rogers argues unequivocally for equal rights in the church and in society for people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, or transgender. Throughout history, he observes Christianity has moved toward ever greater openness and inclusiveness. Today’s church is led by many of those who were once cast out: people of color, women, and divorced and remarried people.

He argues that when we interpret the Bible through the lens of Jesus’ redemptive life and ministry, we see that the church is called to grant equal rights to all people. *Jesus, the Bible, and Homosexuality* describes Rogers’ own change of mind and heart on the issue; charts the church’s well-documented history of using biblical passages to oppress marginalized groups; argues for a Christ-centered reading of Scripture; debunks oft-repeated stereotypes about gays and lesbians; and concludes with ideas for how the church can heal itself and move forward again.” (from amazon.com)

Dr. Rogers will also preach and lead an unscripted discussion at 11 am, Sun., Feb. 27. - Pat Magee

Session Beat

At Stone Church's regular Session meeting Dec. 12, the Reverend Marge Palmer spoke about interest she and Mary Johnson, Parish Nurse, have in a ministry of health and wholeness at Stone. One beginning might be to hold services of healing; Marge has had past experience with such services. Mary will speak to the Session about other possibilities.

Session voted to recommend to the Congregation an increase in the size of Session to 19 Elders. The committees need continuity of leadership; the increase would allot 2 Elders to each committee; one the moderator, the other, a moderator in training.

Buildings & Grounds is addressing the malfunctioning sanctuary sound system. Consensus of Session is the system must be fixed or replaced.

Session set the annual Congregational Meeting for Jan. 21, 2007.

Session voted approval of inviting 3 organizations (More Light Presbyterians, the Covenant Network, and That All May Freely Serve) to hold a joint worship service at Stone during the 2008 General Assembly (not to conflict with Stone's regular worship). At the 2006 GA in Birmingham, these groups could not find a single Presbyterian Church that would host them in worship. Stone has a long tradition of being an open and affirming congregation.

Session had an extensive discussion of the use of alcoholic beverages in social events. While many Session members personally enjoy wine, concern was expressed about the church's responsibility to families and young people in our community. Finally, Session voted to allow the Men's Workgroup to serve wine at the Crab Feed on Feb. 3; the vote was evenly divided — 6 yes and 5 no.

Derk Johnson reported on truly good pledge results from the *Consecration Sunday* program and underscored his belief in continuing this spiritual approach to giving.

Capital Campaign Crosses \$1M Mark

Total contributions to the Capital Campaign now exceed *one million dollars*. This milestone occurred in mid-November, three-and-a-half years into the five-year campaign. We remain on target to reach our pledged goal of \$1.5 million by June 2008, the official end of the campaign.

The Capital Campaign has made possible the much needed renewal of our 50-year-old facility, the physical results of which are obvious.

Less obvious, but even more important, are the intangibles of congregational renewal and outreach. Since completion of the renovation in March 2005, the Social Hall has seen more activities than ever in the past. Wonderful luncheons have taken place, including the November San Jose Presbytery meeting, Consecration Sunday, gathering of Presbyterian Women in the Presbytery, and PW's Epiphany Tea. Fellowship events sponsored by the Membership and Evangelism board have been held each month. Who can forget the "Great Expectations" of Rally Day and the special Thanksgiving dinner.

Four Henrietta Perdue Memorial Lectures open to the public have been held, utilizing the Social Hall as well as the Sanctuary: Marcus Borg (April 2005), Philip Clayton (August 2005), Philip Newell (May 2006), and John Dominic Crossan (October 2006).

The Nursery is warm, bright, visible, and attractive for parents with young children. Women from other churches come, look, and drool at our kitchen facility. Lincoln House is the nerve center of the church on week days and gives us a working address on busy Lincoln Avenue, an unforeseen bonus of the renovation.

We thank all who have met their pledge commitments, those who faithfully continue to give to the campaign, and those who have given one-time donations. If you were not a member when the campaign began in July 2003 and would like to start a pledge, or if you have completed your pledge and wish to pledge an additional amount, please contact the Capital Campaign Chairman, Mel Goertz.

as InnVision, with a variety of hands-on projects to serve the homeless. Funds raised will let them make gifts of materials to these projects and purchase consumables and safety equipment for the group.

Sign-ups will begin after Christmas. Suggested donations are \$18 for adults and \$5 for youth (young kids are free). Since this is a fundraiser, additional donations are always welcome, and if you can't make it, consider buying tickets and donating them for someone else to attend.

Communion Sunday Food Drive

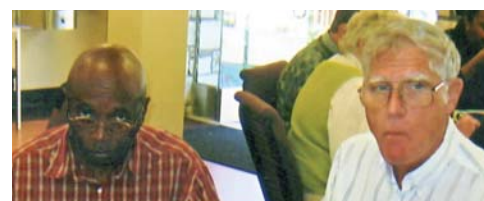

While talking with Tony at the Consecration Sunday dinner in October, I learned he was studying for the Cisco networking certification exam. Since he didn't have access to networking equipment, through surplus stores, eBay, and refurbishing excess computers, I helped him set up a corporate-type networking lab.

In the meantime, Tony has successfully undergone an asylum hearing and has received permission to work. He has a 1-year extension to stay and to apply for a green card. He's preparing for employment through Catholic Charities and other connections. A university graduate in Information Systems & Technology, he has much business experience including operating his own businesses and purchasing and supply management for an American company in Kenya. He may soon be looking for a room to rent. I hope our church will help in his transition to American life.
