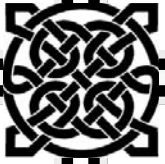

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OPENS DOOR TO ORDINATION OF GAYS AND LESBIANS

It was a privilege to serve as a Commissioner to General Assembly last month, and I was so proud of our presbytery and the royal welcome given all Commissioners and many others who came to San Jose for this important gathering of the PCUSA!

One of the most contentious issues we had to deal with (and which General Assemblies have debated for many years) was the question of G-6.0106b in the *Book of Order*, which requires church officers – Elders, Deacons and Ministers of the Word and Sacrament – to live in “fidelity within the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman or chastity in singleness.” This prevents most gays and lesbians in our

denomination from being ordained.

We, of the 218th General Assembly, voted 380 to 325 to delete G-6.0106b from the *Book of Order* and to replace it with a new G-6.0106b, which would read “Those who are called to ordained service in the church, by their assent to the constitutional questions for ordination and installation, pledge themselves to live lives obedient to Jesus Christ the Head of the Church, striving to follow where he leads through the witness of Scriptures, and to understand the Scriptures through the instruction of the Confessions. In so doing, they declare their fidelity to the standards of the Church. Each governing body charged with examination for ordination and/or installation establishes the candidates sincere efforts to adhere to these standards.”

This, however, is not a *done deal*. It

must go to the 173 presbyteries for a vote and needs a simple majority to take effect. Voting will take place between now and GA 2010.

Editor's Note: This year's General Assembly also abolished a group of legal interpretations of church law, called Authoritative Interpretations, by the General Assembly Permanent Judicial Commission, which had enforced the ban on ordination of homosexuals. This action does not require further ratification.

Since 1998, the Stone Church Session has affirmed that all members of Stone Church, regardless of race, ethnic background or sexual orientation, are eligible for ordination and installation to church office and has instructed the nominating committee to disregard the provisions of G-6.0106b. The Covenant of Dissent and Support on the Stone Church website provides more about Stone's position. (Thanks to Pat Magee for this elucidation.)

Dr. John Dominic Crossan Returns to Lecture at Stone

Dr. John Dominic Crossan, eminent New Testament scholar, returns to Stone Church the weekend of October 24 and 25 as Henrietta Perdue Lecturer on the subject, *Paul and the Justice of Equality: Jesus' Apostle against Rome's Empire*.



Many theories exist about who Paul was, what he believed, and what role he played in the origins of Christianity. Using archaeological and textual evidence and taking advantage of recent major discoveries, Dr. Crossan discovers the real Paul as a dedicated successor of Jesus, carrying on Jesus' mission of inaugurating the Kingdom of God on earth against the reign of Rome.

The cost will be \$20 for the Friday night lecture, \$30 for the Saturday three-lecture series, or \$35 for both programs. - Pat Magee

Stone Works Begins Their “Caring Works” with Focus on Homelessness

Greetings from the new, forming Stone Church Stone Works Committee! All of us are very excited to begin our work on the committee. Emails have been circulating at dizzying speeds to begin meeting, to be informed of the events and projects currently active, and to think of new ways we can serve God, our church and our community.

One of our first projects is centered on August 10, which has been designated as *Homelessness/Affordable Housing Sunday* by the PCUSA. On that day, congregations are encouraged to think about, pray about, and worship in a way that will make us more sensitive to the crisis in homelessness in our communities.

We will be displaying posters, encouraging dialog about this crisis and presenting some ways that we can support efforts to end homelessness in our communities as individuals, and as a community of faith.

In our own Santa Clara

County, we have approximately 7,000 unhoused people. Of those unhoused, 30% are children. Currently in Santa Clara County, there is a lifetime of waiting for a Section 8 voucher.

On a national level:

- Each year in the United States, 3.5 million people live in shelters or on the streets. Over one million of these are children.

- A person working full-time at minimum wage lives five thousand dollars below the poverty level for a family of three.

In our response to this information, let us pray with Amos:

But let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream. (Amos 5:24)

Currently, we are planning to hold a Health Fair this fall that will cover a variety of health-related issues pertinent to all congregation members. We will keep you posted on this upcoming exciting event.
