HOLY WEEK AT STONE CHURCH

Palm Sunday, April 5, 9:30 am

We come into worship with palm branches waving, choir processing, congregation singing loud hosannas, and Communion Table set.

Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week.

A Time for Meditation, Silence, and Prayer, April 7, 6:45 - 7:30 pm

For several years, Stone Church of Willow Glen has offered a service of prayer and meditation based on the worship practices of an ecumenical, monastic community in a small French village in Burgundy.

The worship of Taizé is a blend of candlelight, silence, meditative singing, and prayer.

Maundy Thursday Service, with Choir Concert, April 9, 7 pm

This service of worship centers on Jesus' *Last Supper* with his disciples. The service begins with the feeling of good friends sharing a common meal - then the story moves into betrayal and abandonment. The Chancel Choir ends the service by singing, *The Seven Last Words of Christ*, by Théodore Dubois. We leave in silence.

Good Friday, April 10, 8 am - 5 pm

The Sanctuary is open for personal reflection and meditation. No formal worship is planned, but don't be surprised if someone offers his or her musical gifts.

Easter Egg Hunt - April 11, 9-11 am

Come join the hunt - ages 10 and under - or anyone *young at heart*.

Easter Sunrise Service and Renewal of Baptism, April 12, 6:37 am, Church Patio

We greet *The Resurrection of our Lord* with the rising of the sun! This is a brief time of worship, complete with song, prayers, a brief homily by the Rev. David McCreath, and a special time to remember our baptisms. After the service, we'll go into the social hall for coffee and hot cross buns. Rain or shine, we'll be there!

Easter Worship Service, April 12, 9:30 am, Sanctuary

With brass musicians playing songs of the Resurrection, Easter flowers, and God's gathered community of faith, we will celebrate *The Risen Lord*. Come and be renewed!

May 17, May 24, June 21: Faith Journeys at Stone Church

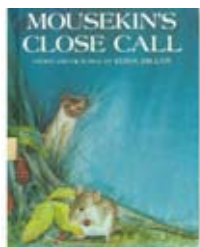

NEW CYMBELSTERN ADDED TO CHURCH ORGAN

Something new has been added to the church organ.

During Advent, when you heard "bells" tinkling in the distance (excluding the Christmas Eve service to which everyone brought bells!), did you wonder what you were hearing?

It was the new *Cymbelstern*.

A *Cymbelstern* is a musical instrument that rings small bells at random as an accompaniment to organ music. *Cymbelsterns* have been used for centuries in devotional music.

Cymbelstern means "Cymbal Star." In fact, the original *Cymbelsterns* were made in the shape of a star with small bells at each point. The star

was turned, either manually or pneumatically, and the bells were struck by stationary clappers mounted around the star. Modern *Cymbelsterns* are electrically operated. The bells do not rotate - instead, a rotating device in the center strikes the bells.

To see the *Cymbelstern*, stand in the center of the chancel facing the organ, and look up, almost to the ceiling. In the far left corner, you will see a small black box, which contains the *Cymbelstern*.

You may hear it during the service now and again - not often - but when you do, what a glorious sound!

Justice for the Working Poor, April 2, 4:30 pm

Join with the ecumenical faith community in a brief *Ceremony of Lament and Celebration*, on behalf of hotel workers, at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, 282 Almaden Blvd., San Jose, on April 2, at 4:30 pm.

We will present honey and bitter herbs to express our faith, which calls for justice - we *celebrate* the Marriott Hotel for its recent contract with workers, while we *lament* the proposals of the Hilton San Jose/Crowne Plaza, which make part-time workers ineligible for health care, sick days, and pensions, and offer very low wage increases.

During an early February meeting of the Communications Subcommittee, we all *wished* we had better quality equipment to videotape the upcoming Henrietta Perdue Lectures with Dr. Patrick Miller.

The following day, Ken and I met with Bob Tablak, Ed and June's son.

Bob had some video equipment he was no longer using, and he decided to donate this equipment to Stone.

That Friday, Bob presented to Ken and me a *treasure trove* of professional

video equipment, which included all of the following:

- 2 video cameras with microphone input
- 2 wireless microphones and 4 transmitters
- 2 microphone receivers
- 1 boom microphone
- 2 very tall tripods
- 1 video player
- Many cables and connectors

To reflect the miracle I felt in my heart from this generous donation, I named the cameras for characters in *Fiddler on the Roof*. If you know the

story, Tevye grants *Motel* and *Tzeitel's* unusual request to marry, and Motel sings *Miracle of Miracles*.

After just a few days of learning how to use this sophisticated equipment, we videotaped the Henrietta Perdue Lectures and the sermon by Dr. Miller. The DVDs we created have excellent video and audio quality! You may have also seen us videotaping a Sunday service or a Taizé service.

The regular Session meeting on March 17 covered quite a few items. Here are the highlights:

Mel Goertz, Budget & Finance chair, reported positive news: giving is in good shape at this point. Recorded pledges have come to \$430,000 for the year, and loose offerings continue to come in over budget.

SESSION BEAT

The Session approved a change of date for the Buildings & Grounds *Patio Sale*, which is now July 17 - 18. Earnings are to be divided as follows: CE/Middle School (10%); Worship/Taize (30%); Worship/Choir (30%); B&G (30%). Many helpers will be needed. Judi Kaiser, B&G chair, is the organizer.

Session approved a Girl Scout *E-Waste* recycling project on Saturday June 27, led by Janet Hatch-Franklin. The event will take a whole day, and because of trucks parked onsite, and ensuing drop-off traffic, there will be no access for other events at the church that day.

Jonathan Miller, Christian Education chair, reported on the successful *Young Families Summit* on February 28. About 24 people attended, with additional input from a half-dozen more who couldn't attend. Data from the discussions is being tabulated, and Jonathan will have a full report at a future Session meeting.

Carrie Giorgianni, Health Ministry chair, reported that an *Emergency Preparedness Workshop*, run by the City

of San Jose, is scheduled for Monday, March 30, from 7 to 9 pm. HM also wants to develop an emergency evacuation plan for the sanctuary and schedule related drills.

Michele Chandler, for Membership & Evangelism, reported that 21 people have joined the *Stone Church Group* of the networking tool, *LinkedIn* (www.linkedin.com). M&E would love to have more folks join to support Stone's job-seeking members.

Session approved having a *Quarter Tower* (for quarter coins) at Coffee Fellowship so adults can join the church school in raising funds for Heifer. Session also approved an *Easter Egg Giving Tree* to collect items for *Refugee Welcome Backpacks*.

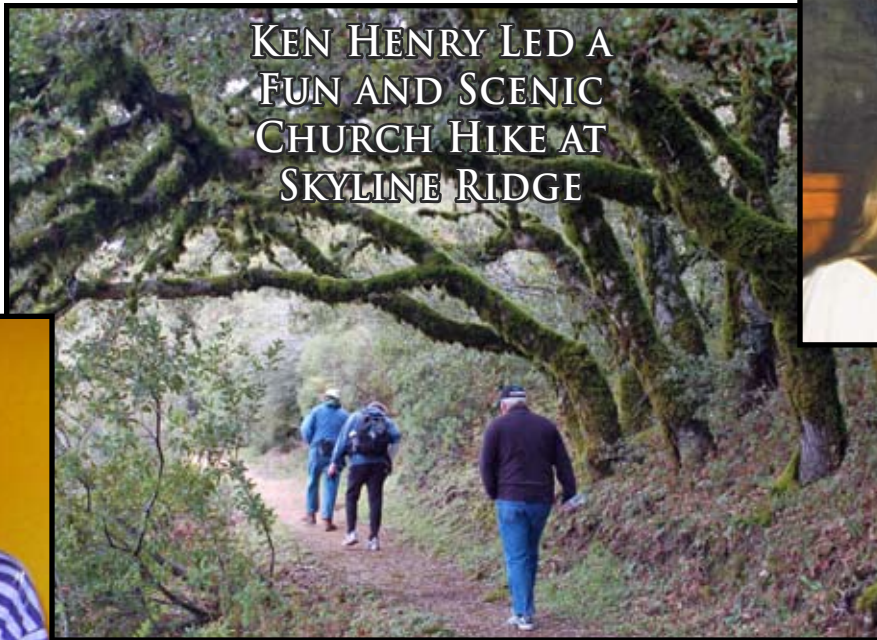

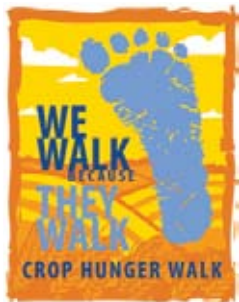

CROP WALK FOR HUNGER, APRIL 26

The need to support people who are hungry is overwhelming during these sad economic times. We are even hearing stories about food banks that are having to turn people away – truly an unacceptable situation.



This is the 32nd year for the *South Bay CROP Walk for Hunger*, which was the 26th (out of 1,600) walk in the US last year in money raised (\$67,791) – much of it due to the generosity of you, Stone Church members.

One-fourth of the money raised goes to local organizations – Second Harvest and Sacred Heart Community Service. The rest goes to Church World Service’s hunger-

fighting efforts in 80 different countries.

This year, please sponsor a walker, or **join us** as we gather at Hoover Middle School at 1 pm to walk a leisurely 1- or 5-mile course through the beautiful Rose Garden neighborhood. The more people who walk, the more attention raised to the plight of the hungry.
