TO BLESS AND CHALLENGE

At Stone Church, it's the last sermon we receive every Sunday morning.

After the organ postlude, as we gather our belongings and stretch our backs, stiff from sitting too long in a hard pew, we turn to receive one more blessing. Up high, over our heads, etched in stained glass, is Jesus, looking down at us from his circular and mosaic heaven - arms raised, offering us his final pastoral benediction:

My peace I give unto you.

The Alpha and Omega - Greek letters indicating the beginning of

time and the end of the age - flank his sides. It is appropriate that these ancient symbols hover over our place of worship - a place where infants are baptized, marriage vows are spoken, and people we have loved through sickness and death are offered into God's hands.

Recognizing beginnings and endings is part and parcel to living the spiritual life. Actually, the entire passage reads:

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not let them be afraid. John 14:27

More than 50 years ago, when this window was first installed, someone described it as "a window to bless and challenge as people leave" and indeed it has.

As the year 2010 approaches, my prayer is that these words would continue to bless and challenge God's people. May Christ's glassy benediction continue to descend upon us, encouraging and comforting all of God's children.

And every Sunday morning, as worship draws to a close and we make our way to the exit, may the peace of Christ go with us, now and forever more.

WORSHIP DURING ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS AT STONE CHURCH: "THAT GREAT LIGHT" IS ADVENT THEME; TWO SERVICES ON CHRISTMAS EVE



Advent and Christmas are very special at Stone Church. Please join us for the many worship services offered during this extraordinary time.

Advent

Ken Henry has chosen the theme, *That Great Light*, for Advent this year at Stone Church. This theme is based on Isaiah 9:2:

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness on them light has shined.

Here are the particular themes, and liturgy, for the Sundays in Advent:

- ◆ Nov. 29, First Sunday of Advent: *The Coming Light of Christ* (A Candle of Hope); 1 Thessalonians 3:9-13; Luke 21:25-36.

- ◆ Dec. 6, Second Sunday of Advent: *A Messenger to Light the Way* (A Candle of Preparation); Malachi 3:1-4; Luke 3:1-6.
- ◆ Dec. 13, Third Sunday of Advent: *The Light of Baptism* (A Candle for Baptism); Chancel Choir Concert and Baptism; Zephaniah 3:14-20; Luke 3:7-18.
- ◆ Dec. 20, Fourth Sunday of Advent: *The Light that Illuminates Peace* (A Candle for Peace); Micah 5:2-5a; Luke 1:46b-55.

Taizé Services in Advent

During Advent, Taizé services will be offered on Tuesdays, Dec. 1, 8, 15, and 22, for those seeking a time of nurturing quiet, music, and peace during this busy season. The sanctuary opens at 6:30 pm, and the service begins at 6:45 and ends at 7:30.

Candlelight Christmas Eve Services

Ken Henry describes Stone's two unique Christmas Eve services:

◆ 7 pm "Ringing Bells"

At the 7 pm service, the emphasis will be on families, with an extended children's sermon.

We'll light candles and sing carols, like *Go Tell it on the Mountain* and *Away in a Manger*.

The feeling will be festive and informal, and the service will last about 45 minutes.

I invite you to bring your favorite bell to assist in the carols – maybe even two or three!

◆ 11 pm "Hearing our Heavenly Choir"

At the 11 pm service, the feeling will be more meditative and reflective.

The choir will sing anthems, and the congregation will sing traditional favorites.

The emphasis will be on contemplating this holy and joyful event.

I will also preach a Christmas Eve sermon, and yes, we'll light candles at this service, too.

On Sunday morning, Dec. 13, from 11:15 to noon, we will gather in the pastor's office in Lincoln House to hear more about this exciting mission opportunity. The meeting will include everything we need to know, including costs, travel arrangements, and where we'll be sleeping.

ROBERT RUSSELL TO BE HENRIETTA PERDUE MEMORIAL LECTURER

Noted physicist and theologian, Dr. Robert Russell, will be *Henrietta Perdue Memorial Lecturer* on Feb. 5-6, 2010.



Exploring *Science and Theology in Creative Interaction*, he will discuss a variety of issues on the active frontier between modern science and

Christian theology, with particular focus on Big Bang cosmology and neo-Darwinian evolutionary biology.

In the Friday evening overview lecture, Dr. Russell will survey five key issues in theology and science. Starting with Einstein's Big Bang cosmology, he asks whether an absolute beginning of the universe at "t=0" and the cosmic fine-tuning of the laws and constants of nature support belief in God. Next he explores "theistic evolution" as a theological interpretation of neo-Darwinian evolution against its competitors: atheism and Intelligent Design. We face the challenge of suffering in the evolution of life, and Dr. Russell asks how we can respond theologically. He concludes by exploring predictions for the far future of the universe: "freeze or fry." Do these undermine Christian hope for a New Creation? Are there any alternatives?

In the two Saturday morning lectures, Dr. Russell will probe the theological implications of cosmology and evolutionary biology in more depth and detail. What is the significance of Big Bang cosmology for Christian faith? Can the God "who acts" truly act and affect the universe?

Dr. Russell is the Ian G. Barbour Professor of Theology and Science in Residence at the Graduate Theological Union, Berkeley, and Founder and Director of the Center for Theology and the Natural Sciences (CTNS). He holds a Ph. D. in physics and advanced degrees in theology and is the author of many books on the relationship between science and religion.

Tickets are \$15 for Friday evening, \$15 for Saturday morning, or \$20 for the complete program. They can be purchased after Worship beginning Dec. 27. - Pat Magee

ADULT STUDY TOPICS RANGE FROM CALVIN TO GREEN ENTREPRENEURS TO ECONOMICS

The following adult study classes are offered at 11:15 on Sunday mornings during December and January.

The Life and Legacy of John Calvin, Dec. 6 & 13; led by Rev. Dr. David McCreath

David McCreath examines some of the important writings of John Calvin, the French/Swiss theologian whose 16th century writings became the foundation of the Reformed Churches, including the Presbyterian Church (USA). On Dec. 6, the class will review Calvin's life in France and Geneva, and how the beginnings of the Reformation shaped his writings. On Dec. 13, the class will review Calvin's major work, the *Institutes of the Christian Religion*. Particular attention will be given to his understanding of the church, and the expectations of the Christian life.

Green Entrepreneurs, Jan. 10 & 17; led by Alison van Diggelen

In July, Mike Cassidy wrote in the *San José Mercury News*: "For the past

eight months, the Scottish immigrant has been quietly producing podcasts on green living and green technology from her Almaden Valley home. Her guests? Tom Friedman, Charlie Rose, Maureen Dowd, Jack Welch and a host of Silicon Valley tech execs." In these classes, Alison will share her "green" interviews.

San José Economic Development, Jan. 31; led by Kim Walesh

Last April, Kim Walesh, *Chief Strategist for the City of San José*, summarized the major forces of change (demographic, economic, environmental) shaping the long-term future of cities across the nation, with emphasis on San José. Kim returns to discuss San José's economic development.

Exploring the Old Testament - part I, led by Ken Henry, Barbara Bracey, and the Parish Associates

This class continues through December and most of January.

SESSION WELCOMES NEW MEMBERS, CONSIDERS SAFE PRACTICES AND DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

At its regular meeting on Nov. 17, the Session had the joy of receiving as new members three people with long-time ties to the Presbyterian Church and experience in leadership. Michelle Lee Vasquez transferred from Colorado, and Glen and Norah Casner transferred from Southern California.

The Session discussed a mandate from the Presbytery that officers and staff be trained in "Safe Church Practices," prevention of child abuse and the responsibilities of Mandatory Reporters. The concern grows out of lawsuits brought against the Presbytery, as well as concern for the safety of all - children and adults alike. Mel Goertz and David McCreath were authorized to create a task force to design this training for Stone.

The Stewardship Committee reported the results of Consecration Sunday: As of Nov. 16, the committee had received 148 pledges for \$382,181, with an additional \$25,000 coming by

way of automatic withdrawals. There are 15 pledges from people who did not pledge last year, and there are 41 who pledged last year who have not yet pledged this year.

The Budget and Finance Committee reported that the budget shows a shortfall in pledged giving for 2009, although loose offerings show an increase. The Session voted to have loose offerings from both Christmas Eve services go to the general fund.

The Session held beginning discussions on resources that Stone might provide in case of a major disaster. The experience of churches in the Presbytery after the 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake is a source of information. With limited space, we probably could not stockpile food or supplies, but could maintain lists of folks who live alone and provide for contacting them. There will be further discussion on this at the December meeting.

Wonder of Our Water Works Tour

StoneWorks' visit to the San José Waste Water Treatment Facility was truly amazing. We began in the classroom with an overview of the water cleansing process, which takes waste water to 99.9% purity. We then boarded buses for a tour of the plant. The first stop was the intake pipe (and yes, it did smell). All those stickers on fruits and vegetables, and wipes marked *biodegradable*, must be "raked" out of the waste water, so please don't put them down your drains and toilets. Gases produced by the processes help to power the plant, and the final inert dirt caps nearby landfills. In the end, clean water goes to the bay and to water area golf courses; this reclaimed water may someday replenish our aquifers.

After the tour, we visited the *Don Edwards National Wildlife Refuge*. The weather was perfect for meandering along the seasonal pond and viewing a levee lined with white pelicans and other birds. At lunch, we heard a talk about two restoration projects: reversing the salt ponds back to wetlands and recreating new upland habitats for birds. The butterfly garden and visitor center were of particular interest.

BUDGET & FINANCE'S YEAR-END REMINDERS

Contributions for 2009 Due "On or Before" Dec. 31, 2009

In accordance with IRS regulations, 2009 pledge contributions *must* be made during the calendar year to be deductible on your 2009 tax return. Please make sure contributions toward your 2009 pledge are received in the church office or postmarked no later than Dec. 31, 2009, so your 2009 giving statement will comply with the tax law. Contributions received after Dec. 31 must be recorded in 2010.

2010 Pledge Envelopes

Pledge envelopes will be available in the social hall on Sundays during December. Those who pledge

on a weekly basis receive 54-envelope boxes. Those who pledge on a monthly or quarterly basis receive 14-envelope boxes. Pledge envelopes are not provided if you make a one-time contribution or have set up automatic withdrawal of funds from your bank account.

In-Kind Donations Need Church Receipt

How often do you buy something for our church, but don't ask to be reimbursed? Many of us generously supplement church programs and just keep our receipts for tax deductions. New IRS rules will not accept such receipts as legitimate deductions.

You must now have a receipt from Stone Church.

To have these *in-kind* contributions included in your annual church giving statement, please follow these steps:

1. Keep all contribution receipts for which you are not reimbursed.
2. Sort receipts by contribution category: CE, PW, Men's Ministry, etc., labeling each one.
3. Place the sorted receipts in an envelope with your name on it, and see that Sally Magee receives it before Dec. 31, 2009.
