WHAT IS GOD DOING?

As many of you know, I enjoy drinking coffee, especially having a cup of steaming java with friends and members from Stone Church.

Now that I reflect on my coffee vice and choice of venues, I think I've sampled cups of coffee from the far corners of the area - from Great Bear Coffee in Los Gatos to Philz in San José - from Elva's on Lincoln Avenue to Peet's on The Alameda - from Barefoot Coffee on Stevens Creek to Monsieur Beans (aka Willow Glen Coffee Roasting).

I've mentioned many times before that I find the whir and chatter of a coffee shop stimulating both to sermon writing, as well as to giving my full attention to the conversation at hand.

Yesterday morning, when I met with a friend at one of these local watering holes, we fell into a discussion about God and the Presbyterian Church (USA). Over a cup of liquid coal from Brazil, my friend shared with me a keen insight: "Maybe the question is not 'What is God calling us to do?' but rather, 'What is God doing?'"

Her comment hit home.

Because while we as pastors, church leaders, and members often find ourselves fretting over what we should do next in the church, I think it behooves us, periodically, to take a step back to see what God is *already* doing.

I suppose it's human nature to speculate about what's around the corner or to forge ahead in a new direction. Yet, I've come to realize if I'm always looking ahead and always planning my next move, I may also be putting on blinders - blinders that prevent me from seeing what God is doing in the here and now. It's all a matter of regaining one's perspective.

Years ago, I remember going on a 35-mile hike with a friend through Olympic National Park. I had never hiked with this person before, so I was surprised that he had a different way of walking through the woods.

While I wanted to keep heading up the trail at a steady clip, testing my mettle, taking infrequent breaks, and getting as far as I could in a single day, he wanted to stop and photograph wildflowers - the nerve! My impatience grew as my friend bent

low to the ground, camera in hand, taking pictures of bluebells, sorrel, and colorful fungi.

You can guess the lesson here. Up to that point in my hiking career, I'd never realized how often I had set my sights on struggling up to a high mountain pass, when all along, the smallest wildflower was proclaiming the glory of God!

I realize it's hard not to look too far ahead, but my invitation for us as followers of Christ is to take a moment, a day, a week, or even a month this summer to observe the many ways God has touched, and continues to touch, our lives.

Right now, at this very moment, ask yourself:

What is God doing?

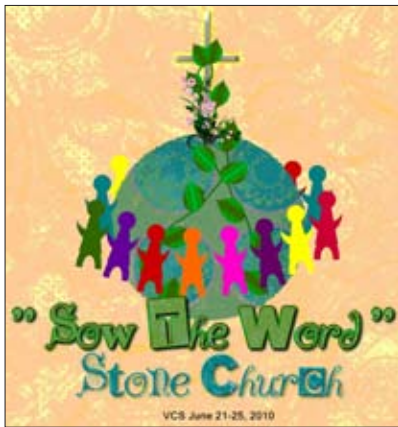

MIDDLE SCHOOL CREATES "WHISPER PHONES" FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

What makes kids feel like rock stars while they are learning to read?

Why, an acoustical feedback device called a *whisper phone*. These PVC phones are useful in teaching children to read and spell because the amplification helps them learn the relationship between the letter sound and the written text.

The Middle School Youth Group at Stone recently created these phones, as a service project, and gave them to first-grade classes at River Glen and Noble Elementary Schools.

After removing several trees, moving stones and tiles to a new space, pruning existing trees, removing redwood tree shoots and hedges surrounding the lawn, and removing debris, we are ready to continue with backyard improvements.

So far, volunteers have assisted in all work, and the backyard plans, introduced last year, have continued at a deliberately slow pace.

Now, we are ready to break up the old asphalt and cement walkways in

CHANCEL CHOIR PRESENTS SCHUBERT'S MASS IN G

Sunday, June 20, is the last appearance of Stone's Chancel Choir until the fall.

To end the year with a flourish, the choir will present Schubert's *Mass No. 2 in G Major*, which was composed in a mere six days in March 1815.

This "Gentlest of Masses" was intended for performance in Schubert's parish church, in which his earlier *Mass* had been well-received.

Passages of soaring lyricism abound, punctuated by Schubert's penchant for unconventional harmonic fluidity - both were

to become hallmarks of the Romantic style.

The choir's presentation will feature soloists from within the choir, Mary Burfine, Agnes Mah, Derk Johnson, and Donald Foster, and organist Joyce Rhodes.

Many thanks to our Director, Nancy Kromm, Organist Joyce Rhodes, the Bell Choir and the many dedicated choir members whose contributions enhance our worship experience every Sunday.

DOES MY FAMILY NEED A WILL OR LIVING TRUST?

When our families are young and vibrant, we often find our time totally occupied with the demands of raising our children. School issues, social issues, financial concerns, and occupational and home problems all occupy much of our planning time. Too often, we avoid the planning necessary to deal with problems that might result from a parent no longer there to provide for the family.

One possible way of planning for such circumstances is the creation of a carefully drafted will or revocable living trust by a qualified attorney. Such a document, along with other related documents (such as a durable power of attorney, living will, etc.), can often provide an effective way to provide resources for your family when they are young, or later when they are mature.

These kinds of documents might also provide a way to support particular programs here at Stone Church some years in the future, when your accumulated resources are greater than at present. It might be an effective way to maintain programs and activities that you feel are effective with your own family. It is certainly something worth considering.

SESSION AUTHORIZES "MANUAL OF OPERATIONS," REVIEWS FUND-RAISING POLICY

At the regular meeting of the Session on May 18, Ken Henry's pastor's report noted that some visitors to Worship at Stone have listened to sermons on the church's website before venturing an on-site visit.

The website continues to be a major communication tool for newcomers. Thanks to Caryl Westerberg for getting the sermons recorded, and to Rod Thorn for his work as webmaster.

The Session approved hiring Steve Nelson and Judi Kaiser to prepare a *Manual of Operations* for the physical plant that is Stone Church. New Elders who serve on the Buildings and Grounds Committee have long needed this continuity of information and record keeping.

The manual is planned as a description of the myriad operating systems in the church, including heating (for example, there are six furnaces in the main building), outdoor watering (currently there are four systems), lighting, plumbing, and a number of others. In addition to preparing the manual, Session authorized hiring Caryl Westerberg to produce an online version.

The Session is currently reviewing both its fund-raising policy and the number and type of fund-raisers held each year. The Treasurer is developing a uniform reporting system for the costs and proceeds of events.

The StoneWorks Committee asked that Session members read the Covenant of Dissent available online and,

in June, hold a discussion of the statement. The purpose will be to see if it can be reaffirmed, as is, or if it needs updating.

The Christian Education Committee has hired two summer interns to work with our youth (see article on page 2). CE is also creating a protocol for getting emergency help to the Nursery when the need arises.
