Hazardous Waste Recycling and Disposal for Santa Clara County provides a collection schedule that rotates among nine locations throughout the county.

This free drop-off disposal service, paid for by your tax dollars, is for residential household hazardous waste, and the following things will be accepted:

- * paint, paint thinner, varnish, stain;
- * garden, swimming pool, hobby chemicals;
- * household cleaning products, aerosol spray cans;
- * fluorescent tubes & CFL bulbs, propane tanks, automotive products (gas);
- * thermometers and other mercury wastes.

SESSION LOOKS AT NEW PROCESS FOR CONTRACTS, APPROVES NEW SUNDAY EVENING SERVICE

The regular monthly meeting of the Session, held Sept. 21, began with Mary Alice Collins describing the people who come to monthly Taizé meditative prayer services. Attendees encompass a wide variety of ages – including young teens – and a variety of prayer needs – from a young man dying of cancer who came faithfully to Taizé the last year of his life – to those who have experienced the death of a loved one. The service is often the one people in crisis come to, because in the silence and beauty they experience the deeper reaches of prayer.

Susan Bedolla, chair of the Personnel and Administration Committee, brought, for a first reading, a new process for signing contracts. The process has been developed so Session is aware of, and has better control over, commitments (contracts) of \$500 or more being made in the church’s name. The process requires that any such contracts be signed by either the President or the Secretary of the Corporation.

The Session voted to appoint Rev. Aimee Moiso as the leader of a new Sunday evening service designed to appeal to members in their 30s and 40s. The intention is to help them connect with the church and with each other. The service is to be informal, with an abbreviated sermon and interactive environment. Bob and Karen Johnson will provide the music, and there will be a mission component. Rev. Ken Henry has been working with Aimee (who will receive a \$1,000 stipend for the year) to develop the service.

The date of the annual congregational meeting was set for Jan. 30, 2011.

Reporting for Presbyterian Women, Claudia Hamm talked about Emmaus House, a battered women’s shelter in Hollister, which has been open for five years. “Santa” Walter Roach volunteered his services, and Jonathan Miller and Kate Wheatley asked about projects for middle and high school kids.

BUDGET AND FINANCE REPORTS STONE’S STRONG CASH POSITION, REQUESTS PER CAPITA PAYMENT

The Budget and Finance Committee has provided the following financial updates this month.

Per Capita

For those who may not know, *Per Capita* is “a set amount of money (apportionment) per member that congregations pay to the larger Presbyterian Church (USA)” [pcusa.org]. These monies are used for operational costs of the Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly.

The 2010 *per capita assessment* is \$27.58. Stone must pay this amount for each member of the congregation. It is not included in your pledge amount.

To date, only \$4,120 of our total *per capita assessment* of \$9,856 has been received. If you have not paid your *per capita* for 2010, please do so. If you have lost your *per capita* envelope, just put your payment in another envelope marked *per capita*.

Financial Report

Stone Church’s financial report shows we are a bit ahead of budgeted income (primarily due to pre-payment of some pledges) and a bit below budgeted expense. This accounts for a current cash position that is about \$26,000 ahead of our budget.

MARCUS BORG ON "SPEAKING CHRISTIAN: RECLAIMING CHRISTIAN LANGUAGE"

Dr. Marcus Borg, world-renowned biblical scholar and author, returns as *Henrietta Perdue Memorial Lecturer* on October 22 - 23.

He will discuss how important Christian words have lost their meaning and power over the centuries and how their rich, illuminating, and powerful meanings can be redeemed.

Speaking Christian: Reclaiming Christian Language is the Friday evening overview lecture. Three lectures on Saturday then expand and explore this topic: (1) *Beyond Literalism to a Historical and Metaphorical Interpretation of Christian Language*, (2) *Beyond Christian Convention to Intention and Practice*, and (3) *Beyond Cultural Convention to Alternative Values and Community*.

Tickets are on sale during Coffee Fellowship after Worship. Tickets will also be available at the Church Office and at the event.

The cost is \$20 for the Friday night lecture, \$30 for the three Saturday lectures, or \$40 for the complete program. Reduced prices for students are \$10 Friday, \$20 Saturday, \$25 complete program. Childcare is available upon request; please indicate need at least two weeks in advance. - Pat Magee

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
