STATISTICS

A poem by W. H. Auden called "The Unknown Citizen" begins "He was found by the Bureau of Statistics to be/One against whom there was no official complaint ...". After enumerating statistical data about this citizen, the poem ends with a question: "Was he free? Was he happy? The question is absurd/ Had anything been wrong, we should certainly have heard."

The poem points to limits in statistical knowledge. And I am quoting it, because as Clerk of Session I just completed the Annual Statistical report

requested by our Presbyterian Church. I've done several of these now, and with each I've wondered what the report tells us and, more importantly, what it does not.

It tells us that at the end of 2010, our official membership was 334, and at the end of 2011 that number grew to 346. In some years we recorded membership losses, so growth is great news. The definition of a member is in our *Form of Government*:

An active member is a person who has made a profession of faith in Christ, has been baptized, has been received into membership of the church, has voluntarily submitted to the government of this church, and participates in the church's work and worship.

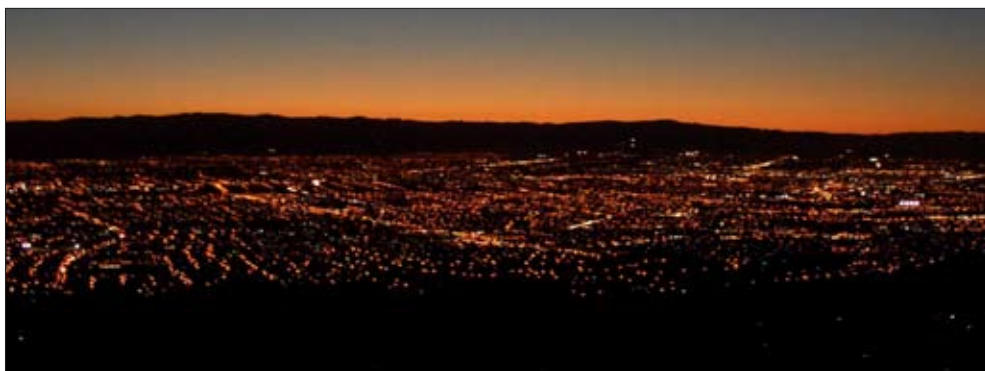
So the record is of persons who have made a defined public commitment to faith and to responsibility in the church. But the great variety of religious experience is not contained in that single number. Our non-statistical sense of Stone is of an active church with lots of visitors, a vibrant church school and bursting nursery (our count of infant baptisms does reflect that, with seven in 2011 and ten in 2010), a phenomenal choir, many active groups, a strong sense of service and mission. There is great energy on Sunday mornings.

We celebrate committed members. And, we remember that numbers don't tell the whole story.

Stone Church of Willow Glen’s *Lenten Devotions 2012* started as an idea from the Rev. Dr. Ken Henry as a meaningful way for our congregation to take an active part in the Lenten journey to the cross.

Lent can be a passive period of “waiting and watching,” but it can also be a time for response and giving – and in this case, writing.

As could be counted on, many Stone members quickly signed up to be part of the project. The instructions were simple – take a suggested Lenten scripture passage provided by Ken and write a personal reflection to share with others. The form of each devotion varies in length and style – some are minimalist, some

are poems, some are personal, some are reflective. The writers vary from our children, youth and young adults to the most senior among us.

We hope you’ll read one a day for the 40 days leading to Easter. These devotions are available in the Narthex and the Church Office. An email version is being sent out, as well, that will make it easy for those on the go with smart phones or computers, or simply away from the congregation.

Thank you to all who contributed – it’s a special gift. And it’s an honor to be a part of this loving family of Christ in Willow Glen.

March 4: "Oikocredit - Empowering the Poor Through Microfinance" with Stuart Kregel, San Francisco Outreach Coordinator, Oikocredit

Founded in 1975, Oikocredit is an international cooperative microfinance investment vehicle that seeks to empower the poor with credit. Oikocredit provides financing to microfinance institutions (MFIs) that in turn make loans to individual entrepreneurs and small businesses that lack access to traditional financial services. "Oikocredit's mission is to promote global justice by challenging people, churches and other institutions to share their resources through socially responsible investments and by empowering disadvantaged people with credit."

March 11: "Mental Illness Concerns" with Kathy Forward, NAMI Director

Kathy Forward, Interim Executive Director and former Board President of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) in Santa Clara County, will present information on mental illness and how it affects those afflicted and those close to them. She will speak on the stigma often associated with mental illness and will share resource materials on the education and support offered by NAMI and other organizations. March 18: "Mary Magdalene - the Hidden Apostle"

Mary Magdalene may not have been a prostitute, but rather a woman of wealth whose financial support was crucial to the early survival of Christianity. The special relationship she had

with Christ led to resentment among other followers, and her reputation was tarnished as a result. Drawing on ancient texts, rare art and the research of top scholars at Harvard, Yale, Catholic University and the University of Wisconsin, we compare the evidence we have with the stories we have heard - and try to reconcile them.

March 25 - April 29: "A Free and Energetic Government - Moving Government Back to the People"

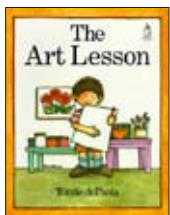

As Lent proceeds, we feel a certain solemnity. It seems a good time to reflect on topics such as prayer, nature, bereavement, inspiration and creativity.

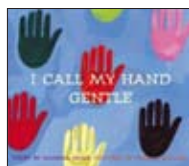

KATHY FORWARD, NAMI DIRECTOR, TO SPEAK ON MENTAL HEALTH, MARCH 11

Do you have a family member or close friend who suffers from a mental illness? Have you ever wondered how families cope with the stigma and guilt often associated with mental illness? Would you like some information about the services available for people who have a mental disorder and/or their families?

Stone's Health Ministry Committee is very fortunate to have arranged for Kathy Forward, Interim Executive Director and former Board President of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) in Santa Clara County, to speak at Stone on

March 11 at the regular Adult Study time (11:10 am in the Fireside Room).

NAMI was begun in 1977 in Santa Clara County with the goals of assisting people with mental illness and their family members by providing support, education and resources. Kathy is a dynamic speaker who will emphasize that mental illnesses are not the result of personal weakness or poor upbringing, but are biologically based disorders of the brain. Kathy will bring handouts with information on the many different resources available through NAMI, such as workshops and support groups.

At a recent Health Ministry meeting, our pastor Ken Henry shared that he receives a fair amount of pastoral calls from folks in which mental illness issues are present. The question then arises – how can we as a faith community offer support and guidance to those suffering, and to their families?

We hope our speaker will have some suggestions for us along these lines, and perhaps you have some thoughts and suggestions you might like to share as well. We certainly hope to see you at this very important presentation.

PRESBYTERIANS AROUND THE WORLD: ADDRESSING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE IN THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

As a follow up to his sermon on world mission on Jan. 29, 2012, the Rev. David McCreath is bringing worldwide mission stories to The Stone News. From *Mission Crossroads*, Winter 2011:

170 churchwomen from congregations around the Dominican Republic came together for their annual Women's Camp in August.

Jo Ella Holman, the General Assembly's regional liaison for the Caribbean, stated

that, "So far in 2011, 105 women have been killed by their domestic partners or ex-partners. The Dominicans' Evangelical church's women are responding to God's call to peace and peacemaking in a society that is increasingly violent. The Women's Camp focused on domestic violence and how the church is being called to respond."

The Dominican Evangelical church, the PCUSA's partner in that country, is the oldest Protestant denomination in the Dominican Republic, celebrating 90 years in 2012.

I forgot to mention last month that this is a Leap Year; sorry, that means we missed "Daisy Mae Day" (all you young women who never had the pleasure of

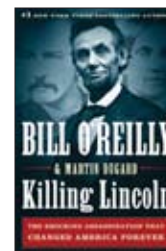
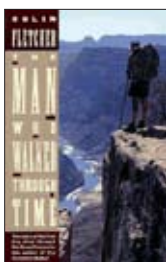

SESSION APPROVES FURNACE/AC PURCHASE, CONSIDERS POLLING PLACE REQUEST

At its regular meeting on Feb. 21, Session heard that previously cancelled Lenten Taizé services will be restored because of generous gifts from congregation members (see page 2).

Ken Henry reported that the high school youth ministry is in transition. The leaders, who have worked faithfully for a number of years, are being honored for their commitment, as plans for the future are being considered. A significant number of the middle school group will be moving into the high school group next year.

Steve Nelson, Buildings & Grounds Committee Chair, got Session approval for a proposal to install two

Lennox furnaces and air conditioners at a cost of \$19,650. The work is to be completed this spring.

Buildings & Grounds supervises the work of Victor Perez as custodian, and noted that there are far more demands on his time than he can fulfill. All groups using the church need to do their own set up and take down, with limited exceptions where help is needed for heavy lifting.

Session approved dates for a Men's Group Book Sale on April 15 and for the spring Congregational Meeting on May 13.

Reporting for Presbyterian Women, Jan Keifer highlighted the five

Sunday Adult Study classes on faith and public life at the end of March and into April (see page 4). These are sponsored by the PW Focus Group.

Session learned that the County of Santa Clara is asking that Stone again be a polling place. The County has an acute shortage of public spaces for this use, and Session is considering how to make it happen (see the article, above, about the need for a *Polling Place Coordinator*).

Seminary Intern John Aney plans to offer a class for liturgists, giving not only pointers on public speaking, but on the role of the liturgist in the service.
