the preschool classroom next to the Fireside Room.

My goal is to introduce the children to a world of learning, sharing and exploring, while parents find support with each other.

An information meeting is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 17, at 9:30 am, during which time childcare will be provided in the Nursery.

Sept. 24 will be a complimentary trial class; tuition will start on Oct. 1. The class is limited to 10 children; registration is on a first-come basis.

The cost is \$40 a month or \$60 for multiples from the same family.

## Sept. 9: GA 2012 Highlights with Irene Pak, Aimee Moiso & Chuck Rawlings

Three clergypersons affiliated with Stone will share experiences and insights from the 2012 PCUSA General Assembly, held 6/29 to 7/7 in Pittsburgh.

- ♥ Rev. Irene Pak was a staff consultant and is a member of the National Racial Ethnic Ministries.
- ♥ Parish Associate Aimee Moiso was moderator of the Committee on Civil Unions and Marriage, which dealt with the issue of pastors officiating at same-sex marriages.
- ♥ Chuck Rawlings, retired pastor and "friend" of Stone, focused on the Israel-Palestinian issue.

## Sept. 16: Tour the New and Improved Stone Church

Tour Stone Church's Lincoln House (with reorganized offices), the Christian Education Wing (the original church), the Church Nursery (why two doors, but only one used?), the catacombs downstairs, the Social Hall (hear the history of the stained glass window), and the Sanctuary (learn about master mason, Manuel Sunyer, and his creation, the Sanctuary stonework). A tour booklet will be available, and interpreters will be at each station.

## Sept. 23: Beginnings of the Latter-day Saints (Mormon) Church

The presidential candidacy of Mitt Romney has created new interest in the Mormon Church. The early history of this church was one of violent persecution and migration as Joseph Smith and the faithful searched for a

place to practice their religion in peace. They built Nauvoo ("beautiful city") on a bluff above the Mississippi River in Illinois. Mob violence by outsiders and the murder of Joseph Smith forced them to move to Salt Lake City as a place of peace at last.

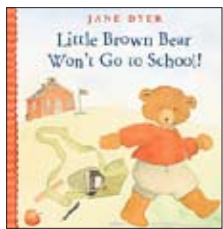
## Sept. 30: What's In Your Food? with Jean Raby, Health Ministries

The Stone Church Men's Book Group has selected readings for the fall. All men of the church are welcome to attend and to join the lively discussions.

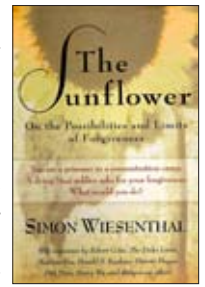
**September: *Biblical Sex: What the Bible Says and Doesn't Say about Sex and Marriage*, by Walter Lamp.**



The author, a Yale Law School graduate, reviews texts of the Old Testament and the Hebrew Bible (using six translations) to outline the literal statements regarding sex and marriage.

**October: *The Sunflower*, by Simon Wiesenthal.** As an imprisoned German Jew during World War II, Wiesenthal is asked to forgive a dying

SS soldier. Years later, the author continues to agonize over his answer. The book also includes reflections from more than fifty theologians, politicians, educators and other community and religious leaders.



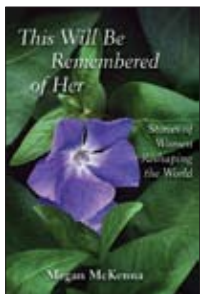
**November: *What If? 2: Eminent Historians Imagine What Might Have Been*, by Robert Crowley.** This volume presents 25 intriguing "what if ..." scenarios by some of today's greatest historical minds.



What if Lincoln had not freed the slaves? What if Roosevelt had defeated Wilson? Each contributor examines a pivotal event, then considers the ramifications had the event come out differently. "What If? 2 is delicious mind candy for readers willing to believe there's nothing inevitable about what has come before us."

**SUNDAY EVENING ADULT STUDY ON MCKENNA BOOK, "THIS WILL BE REMEMBERED OF HER," BEGINS SEPT. 9, WITH WALTER HUDSON**

Consider exploring your faith on Sunday evenings this fall with a book by Megan McKenna, *This Will Be Remembered of Her: Stories of Women Reshaping the World*.



Megan is a Bay Area treasure - an author, teacher, poet and seasoned spiritual director. She is deeply nurtured by her Catholic faith, but brings a grander, catholic perspective - open to the wisdom traditions of many faiths - and is a marvelous storyteller.

What she brings in *This Will Be Remembered of Her* is not just "stories of women reshaping the world," but an exploration of the power and

opportunity of shared memories, profound practice of everyday faithfulness and resistance to "what everybody seems to be saying or doing."

Some very real and important reasons for studying this book include:

- ✿ In the midst of a constant hailstorm of political pelting, isn't it important to take a breather and reflect on the values that give us the courage and moxie to go on?
- ✿ As we look at the stresses and strains in the major religious institutions, shouldn't we take a moment to consider how we are called to usher forward the wisdom of our lives - not faltering dogma?
- ✿ And if Jesus' highest words of praise were directed to an unnamed woman, how do we

honor and listen to the disregarded ones around us?

- ✿ How can we move our church community toward embracing the wisdom and courage of the women Megan introduces us to?
- ✿ And, of course, how would we do things differently?

## “IN OUR OWN VOICE” FIRST-PERSON ACCOUNTS OF LIVING WITH MENTAL ILLNESS

Some of you may remember the dynamic presentation last March on mental health issues by Kathy Forward, Interim Director of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), Santa Clara County.



Positive feedback from that event has led

the Health Ministries Committee to plan another NAMI program, *In Our Own Voice*, on Sunday, Oct. 7, at 11:15 am.

Two people with mental illness will share their stories – how they live with, and overcome the challenges of, their illness. They have been trained for this event and will follow a structured format.

In addition, a short video with stories of others living with mental illness will be shown. The audience is encouraged to participate and to ask questions.

One of the goals of NAMI is to educate and broaden the public's knowledge of mental illness, replacing misunderstanding and judgment with awareness and acceptance.

This presentation has been designed to help audiences understand how the over 58 million Americans diagnosed with mental illness cope with their illness, while also leading meaningful lives.

## SESSION WELCOMES REV. PAK, SETS OCT. 21 AS “CONSECRATION SUNDAY”

At its regular meeting on Aug. 21, the Session welcomed the Rev. Irene Pak to her first meeting as a staff member.

A major item at this meeting was a proposal from Virginia Holtz, chair of the Fellowship & Renewal Committee, that Session authorize purchase of a flat-screen wall-mounted television in the Social Hall. It would have multiple uses for groups in the church, including possible broadcasting of the Worship service in case of overflow attendance. Mel Goertz and Donald Foster would manage

purchase and initial use of the equipment, until management policies and training of other users is in place.

The Stewardship campaign for fall will culminate in Consecration Sunday on Oct. 21. Roland Neufeld, chair of the Stewardship Committee, proposed that there be small group meetings at members' homes in the two weeks before that date, with attendees drawn from defined geographical areas.

The StoneWorks Committee plans to host a Presbytery-wide seminar and discussion, based on a book by

Steve Ketchpel, called *Giving Back*. Steve is a member of the board of the Stanford United Campus Christian Ministry (UCCM).

Fred Oliver, chair of the Worship Committee, described plans for the fall, including modifications to the Worship service order to try to establish a better flow and movement into the worshipful experience.

There was good news from Mel Goertz, chair of the Budget & Finance Committee, that giving on pledged support is improving.
