LIVING FRESCOS ON MAUNDY THURSDAY

The Stone News editor was waiting for my article regarding Easter services during Holy Week.

Time to make a checklist:

- ☑ Palm Sunday: processional hymn, children's choir singing, Easter Egg hunt, and people shouting, "Hosanna!?" – Check.
- ☑ Easter Sunrise Communion, planned by the Rev. Irene Pak: guitars tuned, hot-cross bun bakers alerted, heat turned on in the Social Hall at 5:45 am? – Check.
- ☑ Easter Worship: oboe, cello, timpani, trumpets, two infant baptisms, and spill-over seating in the Social Hall? – Check.
- ☑ Good Friday: Sanctuary open from noon until 3 pm for those wanting to pray during daylight? – Check.
- ☐ Maundy Thursday?

No check ... Not sure ... What could we do differently?



For over 25 years, I've created Maundy Thursday experiences, and for all my planning and promoting, perhaps a third or less of the congregation has ever attended.

How do you make *The Last Supper* and meditating on the last week of Jesus' life a draw for people to come out on a Thursday evening?

This may sound strange, but the answer to this question came to me when my mind drifted back to Italy last summer.

Heather and I saw hundreds of scenes from Jesus' life painted on the walls of cathedrals and chapels. It was mesmerizing for us to gaze at so many artistic renderings of Jesus' life ... and that's when I got the idea!

Why not create "living frescos" on Maundy Thursday?

Why not have a group of guys at Stone Church portray in "still life" the scripture passages that describe what Jesus went through?

So, that's what we did. Twelve guys and Jesus (played by Roland Neufeld) became living frescos. People who came saw such scenes as *The Last Supper*, *Jesus' Betrayal in the Garden*, *Jesus Being Taken Away to be Crucified*, *The Centurion's Confession Beneath the Cross*, and *Peter's Denial of Jesus* (pictured above).

Add the Handbell Choir, the Chancel Choir, a French horn, and guards with lit torches standing outside the Sanctuary doors (pictured at left) and guess what? Check.

Thanks to all who participated in re-creating Jesus' final days on earth. And if you missed this special night of sacred scenes, communion, and music - no worries. I'm already planning on doing the same thing next year. Blessings, Ken

SESSION WELCOMES CONFIRMANDS; ELECTS NELSON FIFTH COMMISSIONER

Session unanimously welcomed five young people into membership of the Presbyterian Church USA at its April meeting.

Larissa Bitterli, Rebecca Hopson, Isabel Jaffer, Ginger Luebcke, and Elle Nilson have been participating in Confirmation Classes since February, learning about being a Presbyterian through activities such as a beach retreat, Bible study, writing prayers, group discussions, and attending a Presbyterian Women's tea.

Session's role in this process, which is prescribed by our denomination's constitution, *The Book of Order*, was to hear the confirmands' professions of faith, examine their understanding of the meaning and responsibilities of church membership, and authorize the baptism of any confirmands not already baptized.

After their examination, Ruling Elder Stephen Stock addressed the confirmands as full members of the

church, able to vote and participate in all aspects of church life, and he advised them to take full advantage of their new status.

[Editor's Note: The new members and congregation took vows at the Youth Sunday morning Worship on April 26, and Isabel Jaffer was baptized. See picture above.]

Session also had to deal with a bit less joyous business in voting to rescind its previous authorization to hire two Nursery Assistants, because the two women who were hired have not reported for work.

It was a disappointing setback in what has been a long search for Nursery staff and means that parents will be asked to volunteer a while longer and will consequently miss morning Worship.

Attempts will be made to contact the two Nursery workers to investigate why they declined to accept employment.

In other Session business:

✿ Steve Nelson was elected Stone Church's fifth commissioner to San José Presbytery.

We previously had four commissioners, but with the transfer of several congregations to a new denomination, Stone represents a greater share of presbytery membership, so we gained a seat.

✿ The Presbyterian Women's request to hold the 2016 Women's Retreat on March 4-6 was approved, and Communion at that event was authorized.

✿ Ruling Elders submitted their requests for committee assignments for the 2015-16 church year.

of-passage"? Does the MMR vaccine cause autism? Is the flu shot safe? These questions and more will be discussed.

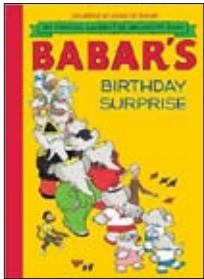
May 24; June 7, 14, 21: "Paul's Missionary Travels in Asia Minor," with Pat Magee

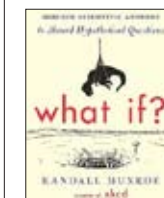
Presbyterian ministry that brings clean water to towns

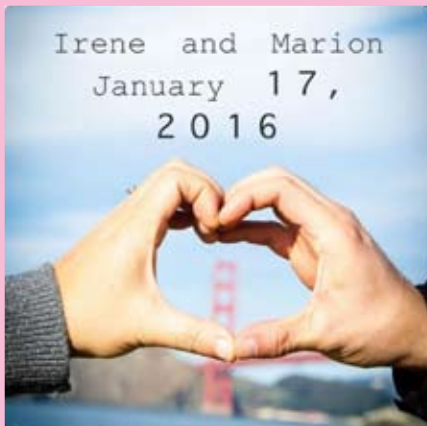

VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL: “CLEAN WATER FOR ALL GOD’S CHILDREN,” JUNE 15 -19

Clean Water for all God’s Children is the theme of this year’s Vacation Church School, June 15-19.

In light of the recent threat of drought and water rationing, we decided to bring awareness to this issue. The theme will not only address our immediate water problems, but give the children an insight into water issues globally.

Each day through crafts, games, stories, music, and snacks, the children will gain an understanding of the statement, “Jesus Christ is the living water for our bodies and our souls.”

Every day we will also learn about a child from another country and their water challenges.

Our mission project will be *Playpumps International*. This is a wonderful organization that provides villages with play structures that pump water out of the ground - for the whole village - when the children turn it around.

I believe that this is a project our children can understand; also it will reassure them of how very important we all are to each other - young and old alike.

Registration for Vacation Church School has begun and is open to children in kindergarten through 5th grade, with youth helpers in the 6th grade and up. It will run each day from 8:45 am until noon, with a family event on Sunday, June 21, during the regular Worship service at 9:30 am.

A donation of \$40 per child or \$70 per family is requested. All youth helpers are asked to pay \$10 to cover T-shirts and snacks. All are welcome, so please do invite your friends and neighbors.

STONE CHURCH JOINS TEAMS ACROSS THE COUNTRY FOR “REBUILDING TOGETHER”

Eight Stone Church members and friends met last Saturday morning at the Chateau LaSalle Trailer Park on Monterey Highway.

We were part of work team #59, and we were asked to rehabilitate a mobile home owned by Steve, a partially disabled former construction worker.

Steve had qualified, through Rebuilding Together Silicon Valley (RTSV), for a work project to replace much of the skirting around his home (to keep out “critters”), to replace and caulk the trim around his windows, to shore up flooring damaged by water leaks, and to replace a bathroom floor and reinstall the toilet.

Volunteers provided most of the tools, including skill saws and cordless drills, work surfaces, and other small tools. RTSV provided about \$1,000

of building materials, as well as painting materials, a first aid kit, water, shirts, and lunch.

Volunteers worked from 8 am to about 5:30 pm and accomplished about 80% of the original goal. Often, it is hard to assess the scope of work until well into a job, and sometimes, volunteers need to return to finish a job.

Rebuilding Together is a national organization that fielded work teams across the country last Saturday and will do the same in October. RTSV had about 700 volunteers at about 30 job sites in Silicon Valley.

**Peanut Butter Banana
Green Smoothie**

Ingredients

- 1 frozen banana
- 1 cup kale
- 1 cup almond milk
- ½ cup plain yogurt
- 1 tablespoon peanut butter
- 4 or 5 dates

Preparation

Place all ingredients in your blender. Depending on your blender, you may need to let this go for a minute or so to really get things mixed.

Notes

- ✦ Modified from organizemyselfskinny.com
- ✦ If you don't keep frozen bananas ready for blending, use a ripe banana and a good handful of ice cubes instead.
- ✦ Regular cow's milk will work just fine if you don't have almond milk on hand.
- ✦ You can substitute 1 tablespoon of maple syrup or agave if you don't have dates.
