OUR PARISH NURSE: MARY JOHNSON

Did you know that Stone Church has a parish nurse?

Since about 1993, member Mary Johnson has been the parish nurse for our church community.

Mary came to us with a wealth of experience, including time in critical care units, oncology practices, ambulatory infusion, and home health infusion. She is currently serving in traditional home health care, working as both an administrator and a clinical manager.

But you might first be asking the question, "What is a parish nurse?" This is a nationally recognized training program where nurses who are licensed registered nurses use their nursing knowledge for holistic health for self, the individual, and the community and combine it with spiritual care. What makes this specialty different is the conscious partnering of health issues with the faith of the whole person, body, mind, and spirit.

After starting out small with a monthly blood pressure clinic and making herself available for individual consultation on health questions, Mary also helped develop the Health Ministries Committee, so



that a broader section of the church could be involved in the holistic care of members, as well.

Currently, Mary continues to do blood pressure checks on the third Sunday of each month and to be available for individual consultations about health issues. She is also willing to make home and hospital visits to address hospital discharge needs and home safety modifications and is willing to make recommendations. Every fall, she gives flu shots to adults. She also collects

unused and expired medications for safe disposal.

I wanted to highlight some of Mary's gifts - you may have already seen Mary singing in the choir, and you may know she bakes all of our communion bread.

But here are five fun facts about our parish nurse that you probably do not know:

1. Mary and her husband Derk Johnson met at Stone Church.

2. She has had dinner with Pete Seeger and his wife on the patio of their mountain-top home in New York State.

3. She is a published author of a chapter on multiple myeloma in two editions of a major cancer nursing textbook.

4. Her father's family came to the U.S. on the Mayflower.

5. Her great-grandmother (on her father's side) dated Abraham Lincoln.

I encourage you to get to know Mary and to talk with her if you have specific questions or concerns about your own health and preventative care. We are thankful to have the gift of a parish nurse for our faith community. Thank you, Mary!

Oct. 18: Discussion with Sushma Ramswami, Peacemaker

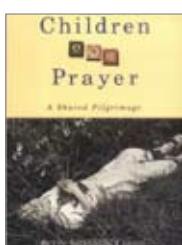

"SEW-IN DAY" - LITTLE DRESSES FOR AFRICA



You are invited to a "Sew-In Day," to make simple dresses for little girls in Africa, on Saturday, Oct. 10, from 9:30 am to 1 pm, in the Social Hall.

Little Dresses for Africa is a 501c3 Christian organization that provides relief to children in Africa. The dresses are distributed through orphanages, schools, and churches to plant the idea, in the hearts of little girls, that they are *worthy!*

The dresses are simple, made from washable cottons without fasteners. Patterns are for two styles: the tie-shoulder and the peasant with elastic neck. Sizes are 2 to 12. The fabric required is

42 inches wide, in lengths from 20 to 38 inches.

Collect your fabric pieces, thread, elastic, bias tape, and other decorations, and bring your portable sewing machine and scissors.

Come even if you've never sewn before. These dresses are simple enough to learn to sew in one lesson.

Plan to be there on October 10! We'll join others in changing lives, one dress at a time!

Sign-ups will begin in mid-September.

SESSION CONSIDERS VISITORS FROM "DEPARTING CHURCHES"

With the departure of several congregations from the San José Presbytery, Stone Church has begun attracting visitors whose churches are leaving the PCUSA, but who, themselves, wish to remain in a PCUSA church.

That was the focus of a discussion at Session's August meeting, which allowed Elders to brainstorm ideas about the best way to minister to fellow Presbyterians who may be looking for a new congregation or may simply need a place to express their feelings of disappointment.

The Session reached no consensus on how to approach this ministry except to agree that this should be a priority for our congregation and that Session should revisit this issue in September. [Editor's note: On Oct. 4, an Adult Study class with the Rev. Joey Lee will address this issue, as well; see page 3.]

In other business, Mel Goertz, Stephen Stock, and Steve Nelson were elected to fill three of Stone's four commissioner slots at San José Presbytery meetings. The fourth slot will be filled in September.

Three items involving expenditures were also taken up:

- ✦ The purchase of two external backup hard drives for the church's computer system was approved at a price not to exceed \$225. The money will come from the Weddings and Memorials Fund. A line item for computer maintenance will be added to future budgets.
- ✦ A rent increase for the Vivace Youth Chorus, which uses our facilities for rehearsals, was approved. The new rates are \$30 for "per room" use and \$280 for sanctuary use, each representing a \$5 increase.
- ✦ The revenue from the Vivace increases will cover payments for substitute choir directors.

And lastly, a workday for committees to clean out junk from their meeting rooms will be scheduled in October.

HOPE DESPITE WAR: MARILYN BORST SPEAKS ABOUT CHURCH IN SYRIA

Marilyn Borst spoke about the work being done through the church in Syria and Iraq at the July 18 opening evening meeting of the New Wilmington Mission Conference. The overwhelming message of her talk was "Christ wins," a theme that echoed throughout the twenty minutes she spoke.

Borst continued to speak about Syria and the glimpses of hope and faith she has seen in the country that contains only 18 Presbyterian churches and 9 ordained pastors. With half of the country's population displaced, she said there is much turmoil due to war and the threat of ISIS and civil war.

Borst had words of encouragement for those in the struggle and those who support them: "Who has remained in place in Syria? What has remained in place in Syria? The church has remained in place in Syria."

In the city of Homs, the Presbyterian Church was badly damaged. "But once again, it was only the building and not the congregation that was damaged," she said. The pastor of the church in Homs, Rev. Moufid Karijeeli, gained a reputation as the "brave pastor." Through the war, his congregation was scattered to other parts of Homs and even to other parts of Syria. But he traveled to each of his congregants, regardless of their location, to be able to continue to minister to them.

Borst told of Syrian siblings Yaqub and Mathild pursuing theological education. Yaqub attended Near East School of Theology to become a pastor, and Mathild is there now. Through the war, she says they both stood firm in their faith and helped the church to continue. Their family has since sought safety in Canada, urging them to come.

"God had not given me a message for Canada," Mathild countered. "God has given me a message for Syria."

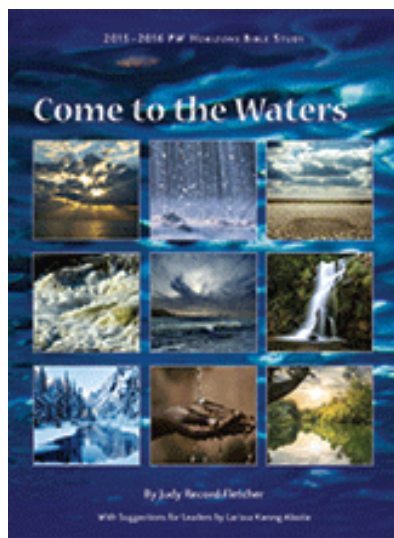
